

Gr 8 Up • In a world in which humanity has conquered death (no aging, no disease, no poverty, no war), ruled by the Thunderhead, an omniscient evolution of today's cloud, Scythes are the only ones who are allowed to take a human life. They are considered to be the best humanity

has to offer, and they roam the world "gleaning" people in order to keep the population in check. Scythes are treated like royalty and feared. The last thing Citra Terranova and Rowan Damisch want is to become Scythes, but when they are chosen by Scythe Faraday to become his apprentices, they are thrown into a life in which they need to master the art of death. They prove to be apt pupils, but when Scythe Faraday mysteriously gleans himself and Citra and Rowan are apprenticed to two other fearsome Scythes, they will have to put their skills to the test against each other. Intertwined with the fascinating concept of humanity conquering death and the idea of Scythes is the prospect that perhaps this is not the ideal world in which to live. Humanity has perfected itself—so what does that leave it to accomplish? Shusterman starts off this series in dramatic fashion as he creates an engrossing world that pulls readers in and refuses to let them go. **VERDICT** A truly astounding, unputdownable read and a fast-paced beginning to an excellent sci-fi series. Read the whole thing the day it came out- the ending was a prolonged, and surprisingly satisfying, finale. It reminded of the *Unwind* world another 200 years or so in the future. Humanity no longer has to steal body parts from children to prolong life because nannites repair all damage and prevent disease. A class of Reapers who go through Jedi like training has arisen because there is no longer any natural death, but like all powerful secretive subgroups, some of them increasingly begin to abuse their power.

I don't usually read this kind of science fiction futuristic type book. I read it because my 12 year old

granddaughter was reading it and telling me about the story line. I thought the book was very well written; loved the journal entries introducing each chapter. My only concern is that I find it very unfit content wise for "young adults" - does that mean teenagers? If it is meant to include young teenagers the content is too bloody, violent and brutal. An adult might find it interesting, and a real page turner as far as story line, but I find it hard to believe young adults should be reading this type of continuously violent story content.

This was one of those books that I did not want to end and read slower and slower as I needed the end of the book I did not want to know the end of the mystery because I cared for both Citra and Rowan. Just like in the Unwind series, Shusterman comes up with such interesting ideas for the future of society! Don't think we're quite ready for this one but I wouldn't mind having some of those pain nanites for my headache tonight! In all seriousness, loved this book and can't wait to read the next one from Shusterman!
