

Synopsis

She engages in an adulterous relationship with a childhood friend, and although he did it after he found out his wife was unfaithful first, not a good excuse to me. Overall it was a good story, fast paced and the characters seemed very real and human.

I love Maeve Binchy and now Diane Chamberlain also. What a great read, the characters are very real, the excellent plot kept me held with a few neat twists and turns, it only took me about 6 hours total. I could relate to the setting as when we were in NY driving to Ithaca last year, we stopped at a small town in Pennsylvania for lunch and got lost on the way back onto the Interstate, so saw quite a bit of the area.
