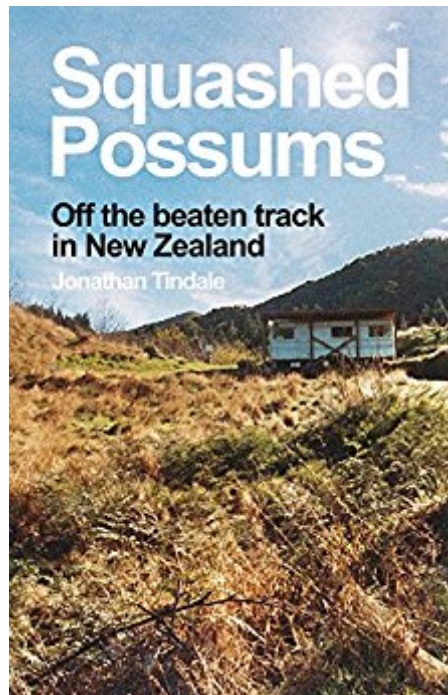




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Squashed Possums: Off The Beaten Track In New Zealand

Bias alert, I met John Tindale when we were fellow guests at a speaking event and liked his quirky, idiosyncratic, and atypical delivery, and wanted to get to know him. I subsequently bought this book, even though I had not got to know the caravan that narrates it. I am glad I invested the time to change that. Squashed Possums is a rare book that balances transcendental experience with cultural curiosity, history, and wildlife watching, with beauty and serenity. It is my experience, and not rare at all, that time spent secluded in the wilderness brings out the inner philosopher, but it is unusual for someone to be frank about it. Physical closeness to the grandeur and interdependence of nature has a habit of opening up the possibility of epiphany, and I loved John's unabashed openness and description of this moment. But, what I loved most is that John also has a grounded insight into human nature, observes the wildlife around him with a gentle fondness and awe, and entertains a delightful curiosity, that brings the whole experience alive and you feel it with him. This is a tribute to New Zealand, caravans and nature, but it is love letter to life. For that it reaches beyond the travel curious to speak to anybody interested in the human condition. Any person who embarks on a jaunt like this one in Squashed Possums is predisposed to seeing the world through a different fraction, however, John is a rare human being who has mastered the art of telling us important things while entertaining us; we don't notice until we are won over, and we understand the deeper meaning without realising it. This is an unusual book not because it is told from the perspective of the caravan but because it has a depth with the potential to change you in reading it.

This was a thoroughly enjoyable read that, for want of further travelogues from Tindale, has me itching to reread Bill Bryson. You don't need to be a lover of travel writing to find your smile muscles exercised unbidden; you don't need to know New Zealand, or yearn to tread the tracks the author's wheels once left, for some as yet unsuspected wanderlust to come hiking to the surface; and even Clarkson would forgive a caravan its inglorious past as a tailback-causing menace, in return for its amusing intrusions on privacy between the covers of this book. Wildlife, wilderness, history and cultural curiosities are described with wit and a proportionate sense of awe and respect. And that's the book's greatest strength - whether the section you're reading contains the humble observations of the caravan narrator or the clippings from Tindale's own diary, you become absorbed such that you almost don't know you're reading. You're feeling. You feel the wind come through those gaps in a far from weathertight caravan. You feel the fear on a dusty track to a precipice over the ravine. You feel the love the author has for the memories you'll inevitably envy and you feel, for a brief while, that you've been there with him throughout it all.

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
