


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Love With A Chance Of Drowning

Opposites attract and then what do you do? Sail across the Pacific Ocean in a dilapidated 32-foot boat dubbed the Amazing Grace, of course. Naturally, you are terrified, but love for an adventurer pulls you forward and you risk life and limb for what? For him. Now, don't get me wrong this is a true love story and I enjoyed the vicarious thrills of being onboard during the good and bad times with Torre and Ivan. However, I wanted to learn more about the stunning scenery of the places visited on the journey. The idyllic islands in the Marquesas, Tonga and the Cooks are all on my radar. Torre never got further than the sandy shores of these islands to explore hikes to waterfalls and such, or she did not find them share Nor, did she impart the history of the Islands which as a travel writer myself, I want to know. But, this is not a travelogue, it is a very personal memoir. Torre says that once visual impact of paradisiacal lagoons was over, she saw them as good places to be lonely. It seemed to me she never did connect with nature, although she says that is what she got from the journey. She was always yearning for the internet cafes and conversation with others. None, the less, she did brave discomfort, the big blue and many hardships to be with her lover. The writing is clever, catchy, entertaining and draws the reader forward. I tend to agree with Ivan who wants to escape society, unplug from technology and to flow freely through life. He asks her "Why leave home if you are going to take it all with you?" Love kept these polar opposites in the same tiny boat for two years.

DeRoche writes "a lot about fear because we all suffer from it in some form or another. Fear of

rejection, fear of the blank page, fear of snakes, fear of planes, fear of bad movies about snakes on planes. If we listen to them, our fears can disable us, kill self-expression, and leave us full of regret. Or worse they can rob us of the opportunity to tell a very impressive story of the time we were stuck on a plane with snakes." She divides fear into two categories: caution in the face of real threats: "Keep this kind of fear. It keeps you safe and happy and not dead." The second fear is of failure -- "This is the kind of fear that I will be kicking you in the for." And kick she does -- traveling the world, sharing amazing adventures in excellent prose, a wonderful travel writing with a unique sense of life. During a trip to Australia, Janet and I spent three days with a young guide exploring that wonderful place -- a gigantic seal rolled down to the sea about four feet from where we were sitting marveling at the sight of rocks that had claimed a ship in a famous accident many years ago. Unbelievable. You can see Adelaide across the water, and Kangaroo Island is pretty big: 150 km (93 mi) long and between 90 km (56 mi) and 57 km (35 mi) wide. Our excellent guide was 28, well educated, and told us he had never left the island, even to visit Adelaide. (You could see very distinct tire tracks on the roads where folks drove constantly turning the steering wheel from side to side while traveling at high speeds.) We learned from several sources: there are two types of Aussies: those that never leave home; and those who leave home to travel the world -- but eventually return home to Australia.
